- tripod
- flash off
- PAS: Use a mode that fits your shot.
- DSLR: Manual exposure and focus are your best bet. DO tests and brackets before the final shot.
- Smartphone: Prop your phone up between a stack of books or something similar so you don't have to reframe your shot every time you make a change.

LET'S GO!

- 1. Try to match every detail: camera angle, lighting, depth of field, color, and so on. Take several test shots and look at them on the computer before shooting the final shots.
- 2. It might be helpful to break down your production process.
 - Day 1: Select your image, scout your location, and find props and/or model.
 - Day 2: Do test shots, fine tune lighting, and sketch out poses.
 - Day 3: Set up and shoot finals.
